Media Credentials

Requests for working media credentials for Youngstown State women's basketball home games should be directed to John Vogel in the YSU Sports Information Office by Email (javogel@ysu.edu) or phone (330) 941-1480. Please submit requests a week prior to the game so accommodations can be made. Those that receive credentials are asked to remember that press row and the media room are working areas and should be treated as such. Children, spouses, and pets are not permitted in compliance with the working code of the Basketball Writers Association of America.

Media Services

Complete individual and team statistics, a running play-by-play, and halftime statistics will be made available to all media. On game day, game notes, updated statistics, game programs and media guides will be available. Telephones and wireless Internet are available before, during and after the game for media use. Press row offers seating for up to 15 and has wireless stat monitors for use during broadcasts with priority given to radio and TV talent. Limited parking is available on Stadium Drive behind Beeghly Center. Please let the Sports Information Office know in advance of your parking needs.

Postgame Interviews

The Youngstown State women's basketball locker room is closed. Postgame interviews will be conducted in Room 103 of Beeghly Center underneath the main entrance on the South end. After a brief cooling off period following the conclusion of the game, head coach Bob Boldon will meet with print and television media. Players will be available on a request basis. Please let John Vogel or a member of the Sports Information Staff know of your needs before the end of the game. Visiting coaches and players can be brought in to the press conference if requested, but interviews are typically conducted outside the locker room and are to be arranged through the visiting SID.

Visiting Radio

YSU will provide an ISDN Line and/or a phone line on a courtesy basis for the official radio station of the visiting team. If additional lines are needed, contact the YSU Sports Information Office at least one week in advance to make arrangements.

Photographers

Two photography areas exist at each end of the court. Photographers will not be allowed to take photos along the sidelines. A flash may not be used. Credentials must be requested through the YSU Sports Information Office. Photo strobes may be available for media use by contacting the sports information office in advance.

Boldon Weekly News Conference

Head Coach Bob Boldon will hold a news conference each week in the Coaches Court located in the southwest corner on the second floor of Beeghly Center. News conferences will typically be on Tuesday afternoon, but times and dates are subject to change. Please contact the Sports Information Office to confirm times.

Interviews During the Week

All interviews with players and coaches should be arranged through John Vogel in the YSU Sports Information Office. Requests for player interviews must be made at least 24 hours in advance. Phone numbers for student-athletes will not be given out for any reason. No interviews will be conducted on gameday prior to the game. The best time for interviews is generally immediately before or after practice. Phone interviews with out-of-town media will also be handled through the sports information office.

Practice Coverage

Practices are open to the media. Please notify SID John Vogel at least one day in advance if you plan on attending a practice. Scheduling is subject to change, so be sure to verify practice times before you depart.

From the northwest (Cleveland, Toledo): Take Ohio Turnpike to Exit 218. Follow I-80 East to I-680, Youngstown. Take Exit 4A, Route 422 East and proceed to the Fifth Avenue exit. Proceed through the traffic light and along the access road to Fifth Avenue and campus.

From the north (Ashtabula): Take Route 11 South to I-80 West. Take Route 711 South (exits left). Exit at Gypsy Lane and make a left onto Gypsy. Cross Belmont Ave. (Rt. 193); at the fourth traffic light after Belmont, turn right onto Fifth Ave. Drive down Fifth until you get to Rt. 422 and athletic facilities will be on your left.

From the east (western Pennsylvania): Take I-80 to Route 711 South (Exits left). Exit at Gypsy Lane and make a left onto Gypsy. Cross Belmont Ave. (Rt. 193); at the fourth traffic light after Belmont, turn right onto Fifth Ave. Drive down Fifth until you get to Rt. 422 and athletic facilities will be on your left.

From the south: Take Ohio Route 11 North to I-680. From I-680, take Exit 4A, Route 422 East. Exit the freeway at Fifth Avenue. Proceed through the traffic light and along the access road to Fifth Avenue and campus.

From the west: Take I-71 or I-77 to I-76 East. Where I-80 and I-76 divide, follow I-80 until it intersects with I-680 to Youngstown. Follow I-680 to Exit 4A, Route 422 East. Exit the 422 freeway at Fifth Avenue. Proceed through the traffic light and along the access road to Fifth Avenue and campus.

From Pittsburgh: Take the PA Turnpike to Exit 234 (16A) on the Ohio Turnpike. From there, take I-680 approximately 10 miles to Exit 6B (Route 62 and Hubbard). Follow signs for YSU and take Route 422 West. Take the second Exit (Fifth Avenue) and turn left on Fifth.

All YSU women's basketball home games, select away games and all YSU Horizon League Tournament games will be aired live

on 570 WKBN. All broadcasts can also be heard online through 570wkbn.



Penguins Basketball on MyYTV and HLN

The Penguins will have every home game broadcast locally on television on a same-day, tape-delay basis on MyYTV. Women's broadcasts will begin at 10 p.m. for single games and midnight for doubleheaders. Sports reporter Chad Krispinsky will call the play-by-play. The game will also be broadcast at additional times during the week.

In addition, all of YSU's home games and every road Horizon League game will be streamed live on the Internet on the Horizon League Network. Viewing is free upon registration at horizonleaguenetwork.tv.



Program Looks for Fresh Start Under Boldon

Shortly after Bob Boldon told program supporters and the news media that becoming Youngstown State's head women's basketball coach was a dream opportunity, a reporter asked the first-year head coach how confident he was in his abilities to turn the program around.

Boldon's response was simple, direct and convincing. "Very," he said.

Boldon, a Northeast Ohio native, comes to Youngstown with an outstanding resume as a player and an impressive track record as a collegiate coach for 13 seasons. Boldon spent the 1990s as a two-time All-American at point guard and leading Walsh to the NAIA Final Four. That same decade, Youngstown State boasted one of the top mid-major programs in the country with three NCAA Tournament appearances and seven seasons with at least 19 wins.

Boldon has since established himself as an up-and-comer in the coaching profession, and he's now charged with returning the Penguins to their roots in his first Division I head coaching job, just 50 miles northeast of his own roots in Louisville, Ohio.

"I'm very proud of this opportunity," he said. "It's something that comes with a great responsibility to return this program to the winning tradition that the people of Youngstown are accustomed to, and it's something that I'm dedicated to doing."

"We have to change our culture. We have to develop and get better. Nobody wants to win more than the team wants to win. Nobody wants to win more than I want to win."

For the past 13 seasons, Boldon has been learning and grooming himself for this position. He has three years of head coaching experience, and he's been an assistant with highly accomplished head coaches. Two of those coaches – Jerry Scheve and Karl Smesko – have been voted national coaches of the year. Boldon spent last season coaching with Smesko at Florida Gulf Coast University, and he spent 2006-08 as an assistant coach at Akron.

At the University of Arkansas at Monticello, Boldon showed he can rebuild a program as a head coach. He inherited a team that went 1-15 in Gulf South Conference play the year prior to his arrival, and he immediately brought the Division II Cot-

ton Blossoms up to an 8-8 mark, which was the school's best conference record in five years. He also showed he can lead a powerhouse as he directed Lambuth University to 29 wins and a runner-up finish for the NAIA national title in 2008-09. Boldon was recognized as the Association of Independent Institutions Coach of the Year after the regular season and A.I.I. tournament for his efforts.

"I've been a lot of places, but this is home for me," Boldon said. "This is where I like to be. My family is here. My friends that I grew up with are here. It's exciting to be back and to raise my family here in this area, which I think really prides itself on hard work and doing things the right way."

From the first day he was on the job, Boldon has not tried to detract from the task he's been assigned - turning a team that went 0-30 last year into a Horizon League contender.

Boldon is an offensive-minded coach, and he's focused more attention on shooting than any other facet of the game since he arrived on campus. The Guins certainly have room to improve with Boldon as they posted league lows with a 30.6 shooting percentage and an average of 48.6 points.

"We depend on the 3-point shot a lot more than last year's team did," he said. "That's why the improvement in shooting has been encouraging. The offense will be faster than last year with fewer set plays and more motion. We want to learn how to read screens and get open. We need to learn to take what the defense gives us."

"Defensively, we want to be able to take certain things away depending on the game plan. That's going to depend on who we play and what their strengths are."


Boldon inherits a Penguins team that will have, for the most part, a roster rich with unknowns for the 2010-11 season. In addition to three incoming freshmen – Liz Hornberger, Heidi Schlegel and Boardman High graduate

Monica Touvelle - there are four studentathletes on the squad who did not play at all last season. Shea Johnson, Kaitlin Rohrs and Melissa Thompson missed the year with injuries, and Youngstown native Tieara Jones sat out while meeting academic requirements as a transfer. Those four were all expected to make solid contributions last year, and their unfortunate absences played a big factor in last season's struggles as only eight players dressed.

Johnson and Rohrs are expected to miss the year again with injuries, leaving Boldon with 11 players at his disposal. However, with five new players and a bench deeper than three players, those factors alone provide hope for a quick improvement. It may not lead to a huge leap in the win total, but an increase in competitiveness will be big progress in Boldon's first season.

FRONTCOURT

Boldon and his staff have a solid base to start the rebuilding effort with as Brandi Brown returns from arguably the best season ever by a Penguin freshman. Brown, a 5-foot-11 forward from Pomona, Calif., was the runner-up for the Horizon League Newcomer of the Year award and was the lone player in the league to average a double-double in 2009-10. She averaged 11.4 points and 10.6 rebounds overall, and she was even better in league games with averages of 12.3 points and 11.3 rebounds. Among her long list of highlights, she ranked 18th nationally in rebounding and 30th nationally with 14 double-doubles. Brown has been named Preseason Horizon League Second-Team for 2010-11.

With Rohrs expected to miss the year, Schlegel is the only other true post on the roster. Schlegel, though, has been solid in fall workouts and has shown the toughness and athleticism to contribute immediately as a true freshman. Schlegel was the Northwest District Co-Player of the Year and a Second-Team All-Ohio honoree as a senior as she averaged 17.8 points at Wapakoneta High. She led the Redskins to the Division II (second-largest) state title game as a junior.

The lack of numbers inside will force Jones to be more of a hybrid player instead of a full-time guard. The six-footer will have to guard a post at times, and she'll play primarily on the wing offensively. Jones, perhaps the most athletic player on the squad, signed with Buffalo out of high school and played at Foothill College as a sophomore. As a senior at The Rayen School in Youngstown, she

averaged 17.1 points and 11 rebounds.

Thompson stands only 5-foot-8, but she'll likely be asked to guard inside at times as well. She missed all of last season with a torn ACL that she suffered in preseason workouts. She'll wear a knee brace, but the injury has not been a big deterrent during the fall. She was a Third-Team Northeast Lakes District pick as a senior at Solon High.

BACKCOURT

Counting Jones and Thompson, 11 of the 13 players - and nine of the 11 active group - are listed as guards. The contingent will be led by the squad's lone senior in Bojana Dimitrov, and a pair of experienced juniors in Macey Nortey and Kenya Middlebrooks.

Dimitrov showed a lot of scoring potential in her first season on campus as a junior college transfer. She averaged 10.1 points per game, and she scored in double figures in 10 of her first 14 contests. Her 27 points against the University of Louisiana at Monroe was the highest point total by a Penguin last season. Dimitrov ranked among the national leaders in assists per game as a JUCO point guard, but injuries forced her to move to the wing last season. She'll remain a shooting guard as a senior.

Nortey has started 55 games at point guard in her first two seasons and is the most experienced player on the squad. She ranked fourth in the Horizon League with 4.4 assists per game, and she upper her scoring average to 7.2 points. Nortey has 211 career assists, and she is only one of five players in school history to have more than 200 assists heading into her junior year.

Middlebrooks averaged nearly five points more as a sophomore compared to her freshman season as injuries forced her to become a primary scoring option. She scored at least eight points in 17 games after having eight points only once as a freshman. Middlebrooks made 25 consecutive free throws at one point during the 2009-10 season, and her 81.6 percent from the charity stripe during conference play ranked fifth in the circuit.

Junior Makala Gasparek and sophomore Maryum Jenkins are also back in the backcourt. Gasparek played in all but one game last season and showed improvement from her freshman season. Gasparek shows tremendous energy on the floor and is one of the hardest workers on the team - if not the hardest.

Jenkins averaged 3.8 points in 28 games a year ago and showed potential to be a big contributor when she scored 15 points against Canisius early in the year. Jenkins has gotten quicker and improved her shooting in the offseason, and she displayed good vision of the floor at times last year. She's worked with the point guards throughout the fall and could enter the season as the starter.

Hornberger is the only player on the roster brought in by Boldon's staff. A 5-foot-7 point guard from Reading, Pa., she signed in June after averaging 10.8 points, six assists and four steals as a senior at Muhlenberg High. She has practiced primarily as a point guard in the fall, but she could also see time on the wing.

Touvelle was an honorable mention all-Ohio pick and one of the top 3-point threats in the Youngstown area as a senior. She averaged 13.8 points and made 55-of-110 from 3-point range her final year at Boardman.

Entering its 32nd season of operation in the 2010-11 academic year, the Horizon League continues to aspire toward its goal of being one of the nation's leading athletics conferences while being recognized as a leader in the development of student-athletes as leaders and role models.

The Horizon League membership features ten public and private institutions that have impressive academic reputations and a storied tradition of broad-based athletic programs. Current membership includes Butler University, Cleveland State University, the University of Detroit Mercy, the University of Illinois at Chicago, Loyola University Chicago, Valparaiso University, the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay, the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Wright State University and Youngstown State University.

The Horizon League's primary focus is on adding value to the educational experience through its four platforms: athletic performance, academic achievement, community outreach, and personal responsibility and accountability. It is the League's belief that athletics is a powerful and visible resource tool that can be used to enhance student-athletes' collegiate experience. The Horizon League's goals are to enhance the holistic university experience for the student-athlete, to create an affiliation of institutions with similar athletic goals. and to adhere to the principals of integrity, diversity, excellence and growth. The Horizon League sponsors competition in 19 sports - nine for men (baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, swimming and diving, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field and tennis) and ten for women (basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, tennis and volleyball).

The League receives automatic bids to NCAA championships in baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's golf, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's tennis, women's volleyball, and

for the first time in League history, women's golf. The Horizon League is headquartered in Indianapolis, the "Amateur Sports Capital of the World," with offices in the Pan American Plaza (201 S. Capitol Avenue), located a block from Lucas Oil Stadium and just minutes from Conseco Fieldhouse, the State Capitol Building, Victory Field (home of the Indianapolis Indians) and the NCAA national office.

A PROUD HISTORY

Founded on June 16, 1979, as the Midwestern City Conference with six charter members, the League changed its name to the Midwestern Collegiate Conference in 1985 and added women's sports for the 1986-87 academic year. Charter members of the conference included current members Butler and Loyola as well as the University of Evansville, Oklahoma City University, Oral Roberts University and Xavier University.

Among other current members, Detroit joined in 1980, and Cleveland State, UIC, Green Bay, Milwaukee and Wright State came aboard in 1994 (along with Northern Illinois University) in the largest nonmerger conference expansion in history. Youngstown State joining in 2001 and Valparaiso in 2007.

On June 4, 2001, the Horizon League unveiled its current name and ushered in a new dynamic direction that has brought the League closer to its stated goal of being one of the nation's top ten collegiate athletic conferences with a focus on enhancing the student-athletes' experience by upgrading the League's market and competitive positions.

ATHLETIC SUCCESS

In the past few years, the Horizon League has enjoyed unprecedented success on the national stage, highlighted



by Butler's 2010 NCAA men's basketball championship game appearance where the Bulldogs fell to Duke, 61-59. The Horizon League has compiled a 10-7 record in the past five years in the NCAA tournament, ranking sixth among all collegiate conferences for winning percentage.

Green Bay's women's basketball team became the league's first at-large bid to the NCAA Championship in 2010 with Cleveland State receiving the automatic nod. The Phoenix knocked off No. 5 seed Virginia in the first round before falling to Elite Eight participant lowa State, 60-56.

Men's soccer has tasted victory in seven out of the last eight years (Milwaukee 2002-05, UIC 2006-08), with UIC just one win away from the College Cup in 2007. In softball, League teams won a game in the national tournament four straight years earlier in the decade (UIC 2002, 2004; Wright State 2003; Green Bay 2005) while advancing into the second round in women's soccer three of the last six seasons (Detroit 2004, Milwaukee 2005-06). Butler's Victoria Mitchell became the League's first NCAA individual champion when she won the 3,000-meter steeplechase at the 2005 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Horizon League student-athletes also excel in the classroom as more than 500 have been named to the Academic Honor Roll each of the past seven semesters for carrying a grade-point average of 3.2 or better, including more than 600 for the last four semesters. Twenty-seven student-ath-

letes were named to ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-District teams in 2009-10, while 10 earned Academic All-America honors.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

In addition to its athletics success, the Horizon League has secured a well-earned reputation for its community service initiatives. Each January, member institutions partner with local elementary schools for an art, music and essay contest highlighting the life of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. with winners recognized at League games on the weekend of MLK Day.

The Horizon League Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) also has continued a tradition of working with youth in Indianapolis during its annual summer meeting. In addition, several League men's basketball coaches coached barefoot to support Samaritan's Feet, and the League's schools and fans donate to Komen for the Cure for breast cancer awareness during its annual women's basketball championship.

On campus, student-athletes have raised money and awareness for such causes as breast cancer, diabetes and hurricane relief, while hosting blood drives, neighborhood clean-ups, Big Brother/Big Sister programs and more.

SPORTSMANSHIP

One of the Horizon League's points of emphasis is fostering collegial environments for competition among student-athletes, coaches, administrators and fans in a pro-active approach. Among the vehicles is the Ethical Conduct Pledge, which is signed each season by student-athletes, coaches, officials, and campus and League administrators. Its purpose is to make all the involved groups aware of the Horizon League expectations of behavior during conference events.

DEMOGRAPHICS

Horizon League institutions boast a combined enrollment of more than 130,000 plus nearly a quarter-million living alumni centered in the League's Midwest footprint. League media markets include five of the

nation's top 35 in Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland, Indianapolis and Milwaukee, covering more than ten million television households and encompassing more than nine percent of the nation's television audience.

GOVERNANCE

The Horizon League is governed by a Board of Directors comprised of the ten member institutions' chief executive officers. Dr. Bobby Fong, President of Butler, serves as Board Chair through June 30, 2011. Barry Collier, Director of Intercollegiate Athletics at Butler, serves as chair of the Executive Council, and Elaine Jacobs, Associate Athletic Director/Senior Woman Administrator at Youngstown State, is the Vice Chair and Joseph Kirsch of Butler serves as chair of the Faculty Athletics Representatives.

LEADERSHIP

Jonathan B. (Jon) LeCrone is in his 19th year as Commissioner of the Horizon League, having been named to the position on May 11, 1992, and is the fifth-longest tenured commissioner among the 31 Division I conferences. He is the fifth commissioner in League history, succeeding Daniel B. "Tucker" DiEdwardo (1989-92), James W. Shaffer (1984-89), Cecil N. Coleman (1980-84) and James J. McCafferty (1979-80).

LeCrone is in the second year of a fouryear term on the NCAA Division I Leadership Council after completing a five-year term on the Division I Men's Basketball Committee.

VISIBILITY

The Horizon League has enhanced its media visibility with a number of initiatives. The League is in a three-year agreement with ESPN that includes selected regular-season men's basketball action (ESPN2) and the men's championship game (ESPN) and features increased exposures each year on ESPNU plus inclusion in the annual O'Reilly ESPNU BracketBusters, one of college basketball's premier in-season events.

2010-11 TEAM INFORMATION | BEEGHLY CENTER



Beeghly Center, the home of Youngstown State men's and women's basketball, has seen a major facelift million this decade, including the new Dom Rosselli Court installed in the summer of 2008.

In the last decade, refurbishing has been done to the hallways, court lighting, classrooms, flooring, lobbies, basketball and Olympic Sports offices, swimming pool, and locker rooms. Also The Coaches Court, a plush room for Athletic Department functions and press conferences, was constructed.

Prior to last season, the YSU athletic department was able acquire the actual hoops that were used in the 2009 NCAA Men's Basketball Final Four in Detroit. New strobe lights were also installed in the four corners of the arena to enhance the lighting for photographers.

This past season, there were upgrades to the women's basketball locker room and lounge as well as the staff offices.

Beeghly Center, located between Stambaugh Stadium and the Andrews Wellness and Recreation Center, has basketball support areas that include an athletic training room, weight room, coaches offices, and a newly remodeled locker room and players lounge.

Not only does the Beeghly Center have an arena, it is a multi-purpose facility that includes an Olympic-sized swimming and diving facility, racquetball and squash courts, classrooms, and administrative offices. The entire facility was built at a cost of \$5.5 million and opened in 1972. It was dedicated in the memory of Mr. and Mrs. Leon A. Beeghly, founders of the Standard Slag Company in Youngstown.

The first women's basketball game in the Beeghly Center was on Jan. 23, 1976, when the Penguins defeated Kent State-Tuscarawas.

Eleven years after construction, the seating capacity was increased to 6,500 with the addition of permanent seats in the north and south ends of the arena and 1,250 chairback seats located along the court. The capacity is currently 6,300 with recent floor expansion along the baselines.

Other recent improvements to the arena include the addition of two scoreboards, expanded press row seating, energy-efficient lighting and a new sound system.

On Sept. 15, 1996, YSU dedicated Veterans' Plaza directly in front of Beeghly Center. This \$500,000 community project was funded in-part through private donations to honor all United States Veterans.

Both the Youngstown State men's and women's basketball teams routinely enjoy large crowds. For drawing a season-high 2,567 fans on Jan. 19, 2008, against Detroit, YSU won the NCAA Division I Pack The House Challenge for having the largest attendance among Horizon League teams. The Penguins annually rank second in the Horizon League in attendance for women's games.



Northeast Ohio native and experienced assistant Bob Boldon is in his first season as the head women's basketball coach at Youngstown State University. He was introduced as the sixth head coach in school history on April 14, 2010.

Prior to his arrival in Youngstown, Boldon spent three successful seasons as a collegiate head coach and 10 years as a college assistant. Five of those 10 years have been at the Division I level, including two seasons at Akron. He spent last season as the top assistant coach at Division I Florida Gulf Coast University in Fort Myers, Fla.

"When I talked with some of Coach Boldon's peers in the coaching profession, they all praised him as an up-and-comer who just needed a chance. We're excited to give him that chance," YSU Executive Director of Intercollegiate Athletics Ron Strollo said. "Upon visiting with him, he made it clear that he wanted to return to Northeast Ohio and help us resurrect our program. He's had success as a head coach, and he has been a loyal assistant under very accomplished head coaches. Furthermore, he has recruiting experience in our region and a solid track record in turning programs around."

In his most recent head coaching stint, Boldon orchestrated the best season in school history in 2008-09 at Lambuth University, an NAIA school located in Jackson, Tenn. He led the Eagles to school

bests with 29 wins, a final No. 3 national ranking and an .853 winning percentage. Lambuth was the runner-up for the national title, and Boldon was recognized as the Association of Independent Institutions Coach of the Year after the regular season and A.I.I. tournament.

At the University of Arkansas at Monticello, Boldon helped lead a major improvement for the Division II Cotton Blossoms in the Gulf South Conference. He inherited a team that went 1-15 in GSC play the year prior to his arrival, and he immediately brought them up to an 8-8 mark, which was the school's best conference record in five years. In his two seasons at UAM, the Cotton Blossoms finished third in the GSC each year, made consecutive conference tournament appearances and earned the school's first conference tournament victory since 1998.

Although Boldon has been an assistant coach at seven different institutions, he has served with only three head coaches

and moved along with them as they received better opportunities. He has spent four seasons with Karl Smesko, the current head women's basketball coach at FGCU, and five with Jodi Kest, who is the head coach at Akron.

Boldon and Smesko teamed up for a combined record of 85-34 over four seasons, which includes one year at Florida Gulf Coast, two years at IPFW and another at Walsh.

In 2009-10, FGCU went 24-7 and earned an invitation to compete in the WNIT. The Eagles were 17-3 in the Atlantic Sun and went a perfect 14-0 in home contests. Chelsea Lyles earned first-team all-conference honors, and

Adrianne McNally and Shannon Murphy both earned second-team honors.

Boldon and Smesko were part of a massive rebuilding project at IPFW as the Mastadons competed at the Division II level. IPFW was 2-24 the season before Boldon arrived on campus, and the Mastadons went 13-14 and 19-8 in the two years he was on the bench.

Boldon and Smesko first worked together in 1997-98 at Boldon's alma mater, Walsh. The Cavaliers won the NAIA Division II National Championship that season behind a 29-5 record, and Smesko was recognized as the national coach of the year with Boldon's assistance.

With Kest, Boldon was the top assistant coach at Akron for two seasons from 2006 to 2008. There, he helped lay the foundation for Akron to be competitive again in the Mid-American Conference. The Zips had won eight games combined in the two years before Boldon and Kest arrived on campus, and they won 10 games in the first season with Boldon on board. With some of Boldon's recruits, Akron went 18-

14 in 2009-10 and advanced to the MAC Tournament semifinals.

Boldon also spent two seasons with Kest at Texas A&M-Corpus Christi from 2002 to 2004, leading the Islanders to a combined 34-21 record as a Division I Independent. Boldon and Kest first worked together at Gannon in 2001-02 when the Lady Knights went 20-8 and advanced to the NCAA Tournament.

Boldon was an assistant at Wilmington College with Jerry Scheve in 1998-99, helping to lead the Quakers to a 20-4 record and regular season and tournament titles.

Boldon, a 34-year-old native of Louisville,

Ohio, graduated from Walsh in 1997 with a bachelor's degree in elementary education. As a student-athlete, he was a two-time All-America selection as a point guard and helped lead the Cavaliers to the semifinals of the NAIA Tournament. A four-year starter, he remains the school record holder in assists (775) while also ranking fourth in scoring with 1,694 points. Boldon was a 2008 inductee to Walsh's Wall of Fame.

He earned his master's degree in liberal studies from Indiana in 2003.

Boldon and his wife, Diana, have three sons - Tyler and twins Luke and Zach.

"Jen has had a successful career as a player and as a coach, and she has a great understanding of how to be successful," Boldon said. "She approaches everything she does with a great deal of enthusiasm, and she will be a terrific addition to our staff."

Theissen will be responsible for onfloor coaching, game preparation, assisting with recruiting, overseeing academic and equipment needs and organizing YSU's individual camps.

Although Theissen has been in the full-time coaching ranks for just three seasons,

she's been part of two successful mid-major programs at Canisius and Saint Francis (Pa.).

In her first of two seasons at Canisius in 2008-09, the Golden Griffins went 24-9, advanced to the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Championship game and played Women's National Invitation Tournament. The 24 wins were a Division I record at Canisius, and the Golden Griffins qualified for the WNIT for the first time in program history.

Theissen's duties on the Canisius staff included recruiting high school studentathletes, scouting opponents, assisting with guard development, overseeing compliance issues and monitoring academic progress. Among the successes in those areas, guard Brittané Russell was named the 2009 MAAC Defensive Player of the Year and finished her career as the only player in MAAC history to record 1,200 points, 500 rebounds, 400 assists and 300 steals over a career. Additionally, five Golden Griffins earned Academic All-MAAC honors in her first year, and Marie Warner was a CoSIDA/ ESPN The Magazine Third-Team Academic All-American.

Theissen spent the 2007-08 season at Saint Francis (Pa.) and helped start the rebuilding effort that allowed the Red Flash to win the Northeast Conference Tournament in 2009-10. There, in addition to her similar duties at Canisius, Theissen was charged with organizing travel arrangements, exchanging film and overseeing team community service activities.

Theissen got her coaching start as a student assistant at her alma mater, Division II Gannon University in Erie, Pa.

A four-year starter and two-time team captain for the Golden Knights, Theissen still owns Gannon's school record for career assists with 835 from 2001-05. She also finished her career with 1,045 points, which ranked 16th in school history when her career ended. Theissen also ranks among Gannon's career leaders with 112 games played, 538 rebounds and 260 steals (260). A two-time First-Time All-Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference



selection, Theissen played under Boldon her freshman season when he was an assistant at Gannon. That season the Golden Knights went to the NCAA Division II Tournament as Theissen was named the conference freshman of the year.

Theissen graduated as a double major from Gannon in 2006. She earned a bachelor's in finance with a minor in marketing and a bachelor's in management with a minor in human resources. Theissen went on to earn a master's in sports administration from Canisius in 2010.

Theissen and her husband, Craig, were married in August 2010.

Schrader will be responsible for junior college recruiting, on-floor coaching, game preparation and compliance needs.

"Kate has a tremendous understanding of how to play the game of basketball, and she will be counted on to be a great

teacher," Boldon said. "She was an All-American as a player, and she's been in two consecutive postseasons as a coach. She is a winner, and I am thrilled to have Kate join our staff."

After two remarkable seasons on the court for FGCU, she spent the last two years on the Eagles' bench. She was a graduate assistant in 2008-09, and she and Boldon were both assistant coaches in 2009-10.

In Schrader's two years on the FGCU staff, the Eagles went 50-12 in just their second and third seasons at the Division I level.

In 2008-09 with Schrader as a graduate assistant, FGCU went 26-5, won the Atlantic Sun regular-season title and advanced to the second round of the Women's National Invitational Tournament. One of those victories came against Florida in the season opener. The Eagles won 17 straight games before their loss to South Florida in the WNIT, and

they received votes in the Associated Press Top 25 Poll.

In 2009-10, FGCU went 24-7 and earned invitations to compete in both the preseason and postseason WNIT. The Eagles were 17-3 in the Atlantic Sun and went a perfect 14-0 in home contests.

As a student-athlete, Schrader led FGCU to a combined two-year record of 63-3. She was a First-Team Division II All-America selection her senior year when she led the Eagles to an appearance in the National Championship game. She finished second in the nation in field goal percentage (.628), and she led FGCU in free-throw percentage (.809), rebounds (5.5 per game) and points



(17.4 per game). She was a Division II Honorable-Mention All-America honoree as a junior in 2006. Despite playing only two seasons at FGCU, she is the school's all-time leader in points, field goals made, free-throws made, free-throws attempted and free-throw percentage.

Schrader went on to play professionally in Holland for the Perik Jumpers.

Prior to her days at Florida Gulf Coast, Schrader played two seasons at Yavapai Community College in Prescott, Ariz.

Schrader, a native of Fort Collins, Colo., received her bachelor's degree in Psychology from Florida Gulf Coast in 2007.



JOHN CULLEN


Assistant Athletic Trainer

Long-time Canfield High School boys basketball coach John Cullen is in his first year serving as the Director of Women's Basketball Operations at YSU.

Cullen joins the collegiate ranks

for the first time after coaching high school basketball for the past 37 years in the Youngstown area. He amassed 472 victories in his 32 seasons as a high school head coach.

Cullen spent the last 28 seasons as the Head Boys' Basketball Coach at Canfield High School, leading the Cardinals to a 433-186



Prior to his successful stay at Canfield, Cullen also coached three seasons at Brookfield High and one year at Badger High. He led Brookfield to a 38-18 record and three sectional championships. Cullen got his coaching start as an assistant at Brookfield, helping the Warriors to five sectional championships, a regional title and a berth in the state semifinals over five years.

Cullen also spent four seasons coaching in the Amateur Athletic Union. His squads qualified for the AAU national tournament three times.

In the classroom as a high school teacher, Cullen taught physical education, health and integrated science.

Cullen graduated with his bachelor's in education from Kent State in 1973. He earned a master's in secondary administration from Youngstown State in 2005.

Cullen and his wife, Roseann, reside in Boardman, Ohio.

JEFF WILLS

Assistant Athletic Trainer

Jeff Wills, a 1998 Youngstown State graduate, is in his third year as an assistant athletic trainer for the Penguins.

Wills is the athletic trainer for the women's basketball and the tennis programs, and he assists Head Athletic Trainer John Doneyko with football and various other duties.

Wills worked as an athletic trainer on the scholastic level since 1999. He spent four years as an athletic trainer for Hubbard Ex-



empted Village Public Schools prior to coming to YSU. He also was an athletic trainer for Salem City Schools and Warren City Schools.

In 2008, Jacobs was appointed by the NCAA to a four-year commitment on the NCAA Legislative Council, the rules governing body of the NCAA. She is also the Horizon League Softball Liaison and a member of YSU's Diversity Task Force.

In her capacity, Jacobs oversees the academic and eligibility requirements for YSU student-athletes, interprets compliance issues, and monitors gender equity initiatives. Within the department, Jacobs is the supervisor for the women's basketball, volleyball, softball, and the track and cross country programs, in addition to athletic training and other administrative staff.

Prior to her current appointment, Jacobs was assistant director of athletics at YSU from 1995-99.

During that time, Jacobs was responsible for monitoring student-athletes' academic progress and eligibility, as well as implementing the start-up of YSU's soccer, golf, and swimming/diving programs. From 1993-95, Jacobs was an assistant women's basketball coach.

Berry is a 2009 graduate of The Ohio State University with a bachelor's degree in sport leadership and sport humanities. She served as a team manager for the Buckeyes' women's rowing team while on campus.

Ron Strollo

Executive Director of Intercollegiate Athletics

Executive Director of Intercollegiate Athletics Ron Strollo, a former Penguin student-athlete, has worked diligently to ensure that today's student-athletes have the support system in place to succeed not only at Youngstown State, but also in their future.

Now in his 10th year as Athletics Director and 15th as a member of the department, his vision for successful broad-based programs and providing student-athletes tools to succeed on and off the playing fields is coming to fruition.

Strollo has concentrated his priorities on facility improvements; full compliance of NCAA regulations; fiscal management and budgetary maintenance; streamlining department organization; increasing visibility and fundraising efforts of the Penguin Club; and enhancing the overall experience and competitiveness of student-athletes and programs.

Outside of YSU, Strollo is also very involved on the regional and national level serving on several prominent committees. He is in his second of four years on the NCAA Division I Football Championship



Selection Committee; is on the NCAA Division I Football Issues Committee; serves as the Central Region Chair of the NCAA Regional Advisory Committee and is on the Executive Committee of the FCS Athletic Directors Association (second vice president).

During his tenure, Strollo has placed a priority on the construction and enhancements of athletic venues. Currently, construction of the Watson and Tressel Training Site, a \$12 million indoor athletic practice facility which will include an indoor track and football practice field, is underway.

The Beeghly Center has undergone more than \$4 million in renovations. In the past year, Youngstown State acquired the 2009 Men's Final Four basketball hoops, new strobe lighting was installed and the volleyball, men's basketball and women's basketball locker rooms were refurbished. Two years ao, a new Dom Rosselli Court was installed and a weight room was built for the men's and women's basketball, volleyball and swimming and diving programs.

Within the past two years in Stambaugh Stadium, office space in the athletic marketing and ticket offices and football suite received an enhancement, the weight room and athletic training offices were renovated, and upgrades were made to the baseball, soccer and softball locker rooms. Other recent upgrades include new chair-back seating (2009), a new south-stadium scoreboard (2009), a concourse-level elevator (2005), a scoreboard and a Mitsubishi DiamondVision videoboard (2004) and a state-of-the-art SprinTurf playing surface (2002).

In the past eight years, the department, which has been recognized as a national leader for its graduation rates, has had many successes on and off the playing field.

Under his leadership, Youngstown State earned full NCAA certification in 2007. This review of governance and commitment to rules, academic integrity, and equity and student-athlete well-being showed YSU athletics operates in substantial conformity with the operating principles adopted by the NCAA Division I membership.



YSU has won 13 Horizon League titles, and it won back-to-back Gateway Football Conference (now the Missouri Valley Football Conference) championships in 2005 and 2006. Most recently, YSU added the 2009 Horizon League Women's Outdoor Track and Field and Women's Golf Championships to its trophy cases.

In Strollo's role as the Executive Director of the Penguin Club, the organization has increased athletic endowed scholarship contributions annually. Annual events keep improving every year, and the growth of the Football Alumni Club has had a positive impact on the department.

Strollo returned to his alma mater in 1996 as athletic business manager. In March 2000, he was named the school's Associate Executive Director of Athletics. In his short time in that capacity, he helped spearhead the transition into the Horizon League.

He has strong ties to the local community and to the athletic department. He grew up in nearby Austintown and attended Fitch High School. He played football for YSU from 1988 through 1991 for Coach Jim Tressel and was named captain of the first Division I-AA National Championship team in 1991. He earned his bachelor's degree in accounting from Youngstown State in June, 1993

Ron and his wife, Nicole, reside in Austintown with their two children, Ryan and Rachel. Nicole is a former YSU student-athlete who competed in track and cross country from 1989 through 1993.

Dr. Cynthia E. Anderson became the seventh president of Youngstown State University on July 1, 2010. She is the first Mahoning Valley resident, the first YSU graduate and the first woman to lead the university. Anderson served in a succession of faculty and administrative positions at the university for 31 years before moving into the president's office.

Anderson earned a bachelor's degree in business education from YSU in 1973, a master's in business education from Ohio State University in 1976 and an Ed.D. in education administration (higher education) and student personnel services from the University of Akron in 1990.

DR. CYNTHIA ANDERSON

Youngstown State University President

After five years of teaching business education at Westerville South High School, she joined the YSU faculty in 1979 as an instructor of business education and technology. She was named assistant professor in 1985, associate professor in 1990, associate professor of marketing and public relations in 1994, and was promoted to professor of marketing and public relations in 2000, a post that she currently retains. She was assistant provost for academic planning from 1993 to 1995 and was named vice president for student affairs in 1995.

As vice president, she was responsible for all matters pertaining to the areas of enrollment management, student services, student life and campus security, including recruitment and retention efforts, direction and coordination of student activities, student government, student registration, records, scholarships and financial aid. She also has overseen the Center for Student Progress, testing services, health enhancement and student health services, career services, housing, auxiliary services, student counseling services, academic support services, disability services, student recreation center, campus police and many other areas pertaining directly to service to students.

Initiatives under her leadership include development of the Enrollment Manage-


ment Plan and Student Recruitment Plan, the first formal New Student Orientation program known as SOAR, the first New Student Convocation program, the Office of Veterans Affairs, the Center for Student Progress, the Office of the Student Ombudsman, the Office of Campus Recreation and Intramural Sports, the Presidential Mentors Program, the Emerging Leaders Program and campus safety programs such as the Student Threat Assessment Team and the YSU Alert emergency notification system.

Anderson's scholarly activities include dozens of journal articles, conference proceedings and presentations. She is active in the community, serving on the board of directors for the Neil Kennedy Recovery Clinic, Leadership Mahoning Valley, the Rich Center for Autism and the United Methodist Community Center, among others. In 2004, she received the ATHENA Award, presented annually by the Youngstown-Warren Regional Chamber and The Vindicator to a woman who exhibits professional excellence, community service, and career support for other women. Other honors include the 2005-06 Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Diversity Award for Distinguished Service and the 2004 Outstanding Community Involvement Award from Leadership Mahoning Valley.

2009-10 IN REVIEW | SEASON NOTES

Brown's Freshman Season Among Best in School History

Brandi Brown provided a bright spot throughout the 2009-10 campaign as she posted one of the top freshman seasons in school history. The Horizon League All-Newcomer Team selection was the only league player to average a double-double last year, posting 11.4 points and 10.6 rebounds per contest. She set a new YSU freshman record with 318 rebounds, and her 342 points ranked as the third-best total by a freshman. Brown ranked 18th in the country in rebounding average and tied for 30th with 14 double-doubles. She also led the Horizon League in rebounding and ranked 15th in scoring.

All Returners Set Highs in Scoring

All five of Youngstown State's returners from the 2008-09 season set a new career high in points for a season last year. Rachael Manuel made the biggest jump from the 2008-09 campaign, going from 51 points to 201 points. Kenya Middlebrooks improved from 91 points to 234, and Macey Nortey incrased her total from 169 to 215. Makala Gasparek upped her scoring from 15 points to 42, and Kaitlyn March improved from 59 points to 85.

Nortey Eclipses 200 Career Assists

Through two seasons - 60 games - in her young career, point guard Macey Nortey has 211 assists. She had 80 as a freshman, and she posted 131 last year as a sophomore. Nortey's 211 assists are the fourth-most by a Penguin in her first two seasons. Only Dianne Rappach (246), Margaret Peters (233) and Caroline McCombs (229) have had more. Nortey ranks sixth on YSU's freshman record list, and she ranks fourth on the sophomore list.

March Ties 3-Pointers Record on Memorable Senior Day

Senior guard Kaitlyn March saved the best game of her career for her final contest at Beeghly Center. March scored a career-high 21 points in the contest against Detroit and tied a school record with seven 3-pointers. March was 7-for-13 from 3-point range, becoming the eighth player in school history to make seven treys. She became just the fourth player to hit seven threes at

Beeghly Center. March had her second doubledigit scoring game of the season on Saturday at Milwaukee with 11 points.

Dimitrov Scores Well Among Newcomers

Guard Bojana Dimitrov put together a solid first season in the Horizon League for YSU. A transfer from Carl Albert State College, Dimitrov averaged 10.1 points in 23 games. That ranked her third among league

newcomers in scoring. She scored in double figures 10 times, and she scored a career-high 27 points against ULM. She also hit at least one 3-pointer in 19 games.



Brandi Brown garnered Horizon League All-Newcomer Team honors as she averaged a double-double.

Playing With Eight

A big part of Youngstown State's struggles last season can be blamed on injuries decimating the roster. The Penguins dressed a maximum of eight players, and they were down to seven on 10 occasions. After signing day on April 15, 2009, the Penguins had a full roster of 15 (seven returners and eight newcomers). Before the season even began, two players left the university, two players did not qualify academically and three players suffered season-ending injuries. Of the original eight newcomers, only three played.

Middlebrooks Shows Big Improvement

Kenya Middlebrooks made the biggest improvement from the 2008-09 season to last year. Middlebrooks averaged 7.8 points and 4.0 rebounds, which were up from 3.0 points and 2.5 rebounds her freshman year. She scored at least eight points 17 times, which was her career high entering the season.

Martin Hands Reigns to Boldon

Exactly one week after the final game of the season, Cindy Martin unexpectedly resigned as head coach on March 15. Bob Boldon was hired as her replacement, and the sixth head coach in school history, on April 14.

1995-96
First NCAA Tournament Berth

The 1995-96 season put the Youngstown State women's basketball program on the national map. The Penguins won their second straight Mid-Continent Conference regular-season title - and their first outright title in school history - with four sophomores and one junior in the starting lineup.

As the No. 1 seed, the Penguins breezed through the Mid-Continent Conference tournament by defeating Western Illinois, 69-59, Troy State, 87-67, and Buffalo, 53-43, to earn their first trip to the NCAA Tournament.

YSU was selected as No. 15 seed in "The Dance" and drew No. 2 Penn State. The Penguins hung tough against the Nittany Lions and trailed 42-40 at halftime and 50-49 with 15 minutes left in the game. YSU, however, succumbed to a 19-0 Penn State rally and found themselves down, 69-49. YSU's cinderella season ended with a 94-71 loss to Penn State in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.

YSU finished the season with a 20-9 ledger overall and finished 14-4 in the Mid-Con. Junior Liz Hauger was named first-team all-conference after leading the Penguins in scoring with 16.4 points per game.

1997-98
First NCAA Tournament Victory

Fueled by its appearance in the 1996 NCAA Tournament, the 1997-98 YSU women's basketball team was determined to not only make a return trip to "The Dance", but also make some noise.

The Penguins turned in a school-best 28-3 record, won 16 straight games, and finished with a 15-1 mark in the Mid-Continent Conference. Coming off its fourth straight regular-season conference title, YSU earned the No. 1 seed in the Mid-Con Tournament and ran the table with victories over Chicago State, 76-57, Southern Utah, 83-73, and Valparaiso, 78-69, to collect its second NCAA Tournament automatic berth

in three years.

YSU earned the No. 12 seed and drew No. 5 Memphis in the first round. The Penguins pulled off the upset of the tournament, downing the Tigers, 91-80, for the school's first NCAA Tournament victory. After a slow start in the second round against North Carolina State, the Penguins saw their magnificent season come to a close with an 88-61 loss to the fourth-seeded Wolfpack.

Youngstown State possessed one of the most successful women's basketball programs in the country during the 1990s. From the 1990-91 season through 1999-2000, the Penguins won 196 games and had six 20-win seasons. Five of those 20-win seasons came consecutively from 1995-96 to 1999-2000 during which the Penguins played in the NCAA Tournament three times. YSU also captured five straight regular-season Mid-Continent Conference titles from 1994-95 through 1998-99.

Four of YSU's five senior starters earned all-conference accolades as Mid-Con Player of the Year Shannon Beach and Ann Marie Martin were named to the first team. Martin led the team with 16.3 points per game while Beach averaged 13.8 points and shot better than 40 percent from 3-point range.

1999-2000
Third NCAA Tournament in five years

The 1999-2000 team was perhaps the most resilient group of Penguins to reach the NCAA Tournament.

YSU turned in an impressive 19-8 regular-season mark but saw its streak of five consecutive regular-season conference championships snapped. Youngstown State, however, was not deterred from its goal of reaching the NCAA Tournament for the third time in five seasons. The

Penguins swept through the Mid-Continent Conference Tournament by defeating Southern Utah, 84-78 in overtime, Western Illinois, 67-56, and Valparaiso, 73-57, to punch their third "Dance Ticket" with the automatic berth to the NCAA's.

Just as in 1995-96, the Penguins were selected as the No. 15 seed and faced No. 2 Penn State. Although the Penguins set an NCAA East Regional record with 12 3-pointers in a game, the Nittany Lions defeated the Guins, 83-63. YSU earned its fifth-straight 20-win season with an overall mark of 22-9.

Brianne Kenneally was named the Mid-Con Player of the Year and tournament MVP, leading the Penguins with 18.7 points per contest. Three-point specialist Leslie Majewski earned second-team all-conference honors after sinking 70 treys.

Dorothy Bowers • 1987-88



One of the most recognizable names in the history of Youngstown State women's basketball is that of Dorothy Bowers (1984-88), the school's all-time leading scorer with 2,324 career points.

Bowers' influence on the court and the YSU basketball program was immediately felt.

During her freshman campaign, the Youngstown, Ohio, native was selected to the Ohio Valley Conference All-Freshman Team after scoring 254 points

for an average of 9.4 points per game. She also averaged 7.0 rebounds per game.

In 1985-86, Bowers dominated the hardwood averaging 23.9 points and 11.6 rebounds as a sophomore while shooting a blistering 56 percent from the floor.

That same year she was named second-team All-OVC.

Bowers continued her dominance in 1986-87 as a junior with 24.7 points and 9.7 rebounds per game.

She was named first-team All-OVC after connecting on 50.8 percent of her field goal attempts.

As a senior, Bowers set the school's single-season scoring record with 783 points, breaking the old mark of 710 set by Wanda Grant in 1980-81.

With her 28.0 points and 11.6 rebounds per game, Bowers was named the Ohio Valley Conference Player of the Year.

Bowers also owns the school records for most field goals in a career (977), highest field goal percentage (.544), most points in a single-game (49) and most field goals in a game (21).

Bowers, who owns a career scoring average of 21.5 points per game, also ranks second all-time with 1,083 career rebounds and 370 career free throws made.



Liz Hauger • 1996-97



A catalyst during the Penguins run to their first NCAA Tournament appearance was Liz Hauger (1993-97).

During her junior season in 1995-96, Hauger led the Penguins to a 20-9 record and their first 20-win season since 1990-91. The Penguins also won the Mid-Continent Conference regular season and tournament championships.

Hauger paced the Penguins with a 16.4 scoring average and was named first-team All-Mid-

Continent Conference.

The following season, Hauger turned in an even more impressive campaign. She led the Penguins in scoring for the second straight season with an average of 18.7 points per game and was named the Mid-Con Player of the Year.

The Penguins recorded their second consecutive 20-win season with an overall mark of 23-6 and captured the league's regular season crown. YSU, however, missed out on their second straight

NCAA Tournament appearance after losing in the tournament championship game to Troy State, 89-75.

Hauger was also vital in the Penguins first of five straight Mid-Continent Conference championships in 1994-95.

As a sophomore, Hauger was one of the Penguins top offensive threats with a 12.5 scoring average. She connected on 42.2 percent of her field goal attempts and helped guide the Penguins to a 17-11 overall record and a 14-4 league mark. In 1994-95, she was named second-team all-conference.


Hauger currently ranks eighth all-time with 1,468 career points, and third all-

In 1995-96 as a redshirt sophomore, Beach was an essential ingredient in the Penguins run to the NCAA.


She averaged 10.5 points and 8.6 rebounds per game and was also named the Mid-Continent Conference Tournament Most Valuable Player after defeating


Buffalo, 53-43, in the championship game.

Beach currently ranks 13th on the all-time scoring list with 1,148 career points and is tied for third all-time with 146 career three-pointers.

Brianne Kenneally • 1998-99, 1999-2000



During her freshman season in 1997-98, people caught a glimpse of what the future had in store for Brianne Kenneally (1997-2001).

When senior Shannon Beach missed four games due to knee surgery, Kenneally replaced her in the starting lineup and the Penguins never skipped a beat. In the five games Kenneally started that season, she averaged an impressive 11.2 points per game.

Even when she was relegat-

ed back to her reserve role, Kenneally made an impact in the Penguins' biggest games of the season. The Brecksville, Ohio, native helped secure the Penguins' 28-3 record; was named to the Mid-Con's All-Newcomer Team; and averaged 12.5 points per game in two NCAA Tournament games.

Her sophomore season saw even more accolades come her way as she led the Penguins with 16.3 points per game and finished 15th in the nation with an 85.9 free throw percentage. Kenneally was then named the Mid-Con's Player of the Year.

As a junior in 1999-2000, Kenneally racked up a league-best

18.7 points per game to lead the Penguins to a 22-9 mark, their fifth straight 20-win season. The 5-foot-9 guard won the league's Player of the Year Award for the second consecutive year and was named MVP of the Mid-Con Tournament after leading YSU to its third NCAA Tournament appearance.


Kenneally's final season was marked with triumph and tragedy as she was ranked third in the nation with a 24.5 scoring average when a knee injury ended her career.


